✓ A place to call HOME What's on the Back to School list? Maybe good housing should be. A stable home provides more than a place for a child to live, it helps chart a course for success over a lifetime. Children of homeowners are significantly more likely to stay in school until age 17 than children of renters, especially in low-income households, according to a study in the Journal of Urban Economics. Only 32% of Newburgh residents own homes, compared to 70% in the Hudson Valley. Imagine the difference in educational achievement possible by helping more families become homeowners. In Newburgh, many children sleep in overcrowded conditions without adequate heating and cooling or fully functioning kitchens and bathrooms. They don't have a quiet place to do homework and can't start the school day ready to learn.

Children of homeowners outperform children of renters in math and reading achievement, even when other factors (like poverty) are the same. These children have fewer behavioral problems, high educational attainment and greater future earnings, according to a study by an Ohio State University economist. With the stable foundation of a place to call home, families flourish and children's full academic potential can awaken and blossom. Housing has a crucial impact on education and the power to launch children on a path to success. Let's support our schools and teachers by ensuring students have a home where they feel secure, can rest, and have a place to read and do homework.
