Building on Faith By Cathy Collins As we prepare to dedicate our second Faith Builds,

I am reminded to pause and think about the role of faith in our work. It's easy to see it as the cornerstone of Habitat. We witness it at every coffee break as 'Habitat Chaplain' Deke inspires believers and non-believers alike. We see it in action every day on site and in the work that happens along the homeowner journey. All point to our deep roots in faith.

Yet there is a different kind of faith that I encounter

here that is critical to the success of our mission, particularly in the City of Newburgh. It's wrapped up in the power of hope. Cornel West describes hope in this way: "hope looks at the evidence and says, 'It doesn't look good at all. Doesn't look good at all. Gonna go beyond the evidence to create new possibilities...visions that become contagious to allow people to engage in heroic actions always against the odds...' That's hope." I often encounter moments where the evidence

doesn't look good. There's no way the house will be ready, the bills will get paid, the constraints of the law can be navigated to uphold the spirit of our program. And then I remember how each time we have found a way to defy the odds. The volunteers and staff perform miracles in getting the house ready, an unexpected donation arrives, and we continue to find innovative ways to serve families The families we partner with place their faith and hope in Habitat. Many of them overcome their fears that things will not work out to chart a new course

for their family through the Habitat program. They gain hope and confidence in themselves by building on-site alongside volunteers and staff, working with their advocates, and completing homeowner education classes. The process instills optimism about what is possible and what is achievable. 

Celebrating a Feat of Faith! Join us on August 19th for the dedication of 156, 154, 152, & 150 Ann Street. These four homes are sponsored by the long-time faith coalitions that partner with Habitat Newburgh—PresbyBuild, EpiscoBuild,

Methodists & Friends Build—and a very special Unity House project which is supported by many different faith groups

Habitat Newburgh has deep roots in the faith community, and the long-standing partnerships have been an instrumental part of Habitat's work. The very first Habitat Newburgh house was a Unity Houseby the collective efforts of local faith communities.

When we built the 22-home E. Parmenter Street Development, one set of five connected houses were

designated as the first Faith Builds, with each home sponsored by a Faith Build partner. These homes were

the key turning point that transformed E. Parmenter Street from a block that had a smattering of Habitat houses to a true neighborhood. The Faith Builds II houses on Ann Street are also serving as a bridge connecting the work on E. Parmenter, Clark, and Washington to the Habitat projects north of Broadway including the five S. Miller houses. These homes not only represent the opportunity for four homebuyer families to build strength, stability, and self-reliance through shelter, they also unify our work north and south of Broadway We are so grateful for the unflagging support of the local faith communities, and happy to witness what we can accomplish together when faith is put into action!

family as his parish. "There is almost something sacramental about coffee break. A sense of fellowship and open arms. The literal breaking of bread. A sense of community and connection." He shares that for him, some of the most rewarding moments in his service have come from these connections, such as a recently widowed volunteer who found the community and Deke's bi-weekly messages at coffee break to be a source of healing, or the homebuyer who thanked him for his words of encouragement and inspiration.

In his retirement, Deke sees Habitat as his vocation and the Habitat

Habitat for Humanity International has said that Christianity is the center, but not the border. This is a sentiment that resonates deeply with Deke. He endeavors to create a welcoming environment for all who work together towards our common purpose. For him, faith is not about building walls, it is not about self-aggrandizement, it is about trying to live a moral life. Deke says that his commitment to Habitat is rooted in his love of the diversity of people and hope that he sees in Newburgh. He says, "We are meeting a critical need. Ours is a very concrete, focused mission. At Habitat we have to negotiate a lot of things, but we never have to negotiate our mission. I look at the capacity that has been built jn 15 years, and I think it's extraordinary."

OWN A HOME!



The housing need in Haiti Haiti is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, with 58.5% of the population living on less than US\$2.42 per day. Political instability, food shortages, unemployment, natural disasters and a lack of basic infrastructure have kept most Haitians locked in a cycle of poverty for generations. Access to housing is equally desperate. Before the 2010 earthquake, Haiti already faced a severe shortage of houses. The earthquake damaged nearly 190,000 houses and 105,000 more were destroyed, adding to the pre-existing backlog of 300,000 houses required to meet the growing shelter needs of the country. Of the more than 2 million affected survivors, more than 1.5 million were homeless. Today, land tenure remains the biggest roadblock to rebuilding in Haiti.

Habitat's contribution in Haiti
To meet housing needs following the 2010 earthquake, Habitat adopted an innovative strategy – Pathways to Permanence – centered on holistic, community-led, sustainable urban development, and developed programs to address land rights and housing finance. <u>Learn more about Habitat Haiti.</u>
